


Foreword




Kitchen - Modern European

Flat-panel cabinets are common, and materials like lacquer, glass, and engineered wood are frequently used. Color schemes typically lean neutral, whites, grays, and blacks, though bold accent colors or natural textures like wood or stone can add warmth and personality. Lighting is also key, with recessed fixtures, under-cabinet LEDs, and pendant lights enhancing the space's modern feel. It is ideal for contemporary architecture and new builds with minimalistic facade designs. Potentially great for Bauhaus or Scandinavian inspired designs.


















Bathroom - Modern European


Euro modern bathroom design blends minimalist aesthetics with high functionality, creating a clean, spa-like atmosphere. Key features include wall-mounted vanities and toilets to maximize floor space and enhance the sense of openness. Fixtures are often angular or gently curved, with finishes like matte black, brushed nickel, or polished chrome. Frameless glass showers and large-format tiles contribute to the seamless, uncluttered look. Color palettes are typically neutral and sometimes paired with natural wood accents or stone textures to add warmth. Integrated lighting (such as LED mirrors and recessed ceiling lights) ensures the space feels bright and modern without overwhelming the senses.


















Kitchen - Industrial

Industrial style kitchens often showcase exposed brick walls, open ductwork, concrete surfaces, and weathered wood are all signature features. Cabinetry is often minimalist, with flat fronts in matte black, steel, or reclaimed wood finishes. Open shelving made of metal and wood reinforces the utilitarian vibe. Countertops may feature poured concrete, butcher block, or dark stones. Appliances tend to be stainless steel while the rest of the color palette typically includes grays, blacks, whites, and browns. It is ideal for urban loft/factory conversion buildings with high ceilings, large steel framed windows, exposed ductwork, and open floor plans.


















Bathroom - Industrial

Key features of industrial bathroom design include exposed plumbing, metal fixtures, and concrete or brick walls. Materials like black steel, brushed nickel, and reclaimed wood are common, often paired with concrete or dark stone countertops and flooring. Subway tiles, especially in white or charcoal, can add balance. Vanities are typically sleek wood or metal bases with vessel sinks or concrete basins. Lighting is bold and architectural, often in matte black or brass finishes. Color palettes stick to grays, blacks, whites, and natural wood tones, occasionally warmed up with earthy hues.

















Kitchen - Transitional

A transitional kitchen blends traditional warmth with contemporary simplicity, creating a timeless and versatile space. It typically features a neutral color palette. Cabinetry finishes may range from warm stains to painted tones like cream, sage, navy's, or soft grays and modern materials like wood, stone, and stainless steel. Cabinetry is clean-lined, often in a classic Shaker style, while decorative elements such as subtle moldings or glass inserts add just enough detail without overwhelming the design. Backsplashes might feature hand glazed tiles or intricate pattern designs.



















Bathroom - Transitional








Kitchen - Mid Century Modern
















Bathroom - Mid Century Modern










Kitchen - Art Deco
